1) The Life of Nagano Manzo: Canada's First Japanese Immigrant (1877) カナダへの日本人移民 第一号 永野万蔵(長崎出身)

Many Japanese people do not learn much about Japanese people living in other countries. I would like to teach students about Nagano Manzo, the first Japanese immigrant to Canada. Born in Kuchinotsu, Nagasaki in 1853, Nagano began to travel on English ships to other countries, including China and Canada, ten years after the Meiji Restoration (明治維新). He eventually landed in Canada in May 1877 and began a new life there, working with indigenous and Chinese people, helping to build railroads, starting businesses, and getting married. He was an early member of the Japanese Canadian community, which has a long history in Canada.

2) The Columbian Exchange (1492-1600)

Many Japanese students learn about Christopher Columbus and his voyages. While these students often study his early role in European colonialism in North and South America, few learn about one of the most important and longest-lasting effects of his trips: the exchange of animals, foods, and diseases from the Americas to Asia, Africa, and Asia and vice versa over the next one hundred years. When people think of Italy, they often think of spaghetti and pizza. But, did you know that there were no tomatoes in Europe before the sixteenth century? They were brought by the Spanish back to Europe from the Americas. This is one example of what historians call "the Columbian Exchange," the movement of living things all around the world after the explorations of Columbus.

3) The Beatles Live at Nippon Budokan (1966)

In the summer of 1966, The Beatles, already world-famous, visited Tokyo, Japan, for a series of concerts at Nippon Budokan. While thousands of Japanese Beatles fans were excited about the show, several smaller groups were outraged, including left-wing parties who believed that they were spreading American values and right-wing parties who declared that the venue was to be for the nation's martial arts competitions only. As a result, security was high during their visit, rivaling the safety of the 1964 Olympics. Nevertheless, The Beatles would end up playing the first pop/rock shows at Nippon Budokan, paving the way for countless foreign and Japanese musical acts up to the present.
